Here is something special to do each day of the Christmas Season. Do one, do all or do them out of order! And don't forget to keep singing and listening to your favorite Christmas Carols!

DECEMBER 25

HAPPY BIRTHDAY, JESUS! Light a white Christ candle in the middle of your Advent wreath, and sing a Christmas carol for the newborn baby.

DECEMBER 26

St. Stephen's Day. Stephen is an important figure in the early church. You can read about him in the sixth chapter of Acts.

DECEMBER 27

St. John the Evangelist Day (I John 1:1-9) Look up the following Bible passages (each passage introduces one of John's I am statements) and look at all the metaphors for Jesus.

- John 6:35 I am the bread of life.
- John 8:12 I am the light of the world.
- John 10:9 I am the gate. (Also translated as "I am the door.")
- John 10:11 I am the Good Shepherd.
- John 11:25 I am the resurrection and the life
- John 14:6 I am the way, the truth, and the life.
- John 15:1 I am the true vine.
- John 15:5 I am the vine, you are the branches.

DECEMBER 28

Holy Innocents Day (Matthew 2:13–18). Bring the food you collected in your reverse Advent Calendar to church any day this week. Leave it at the 2nd floor office door on Albemarle St. You can also bring any non-perishable food or toiletry donations to for our partners at Housing Up.

DECEMBER 29

Write thank you notes for your Christmas gifts while you enjoy some hot cocoa by the fire!

DECEMBER 30

Surprise your parents and clean your room without being asked!

DECEMBER 31

Take a card or cookies to a neighbor or friend who lives alone. Share the light of Christ with others!

JANUARY 1 - HAPPY NEW YEAR!

Learn about Holy Name Day (Luke 2:15-21).

JANUARY 2

Have dinner with friends to celebrate the Christmas season. Sing some Christmas carols together!
